Welcome to Issue 4 of our Opening Doors magazine. We have recently seen over 5,500 children in the City take the 11+ entrance test. The Schools of King Edward VI Admissions Department manage this process not only for our own 5 free grammar schools but for another three grammar schools in the City. The organisation that goes on behind the scenes is extremely intense. Without the co-operation of all the grammar schools, along with our own independent schools, King Edward VI Sheldon Heath Academy, Langley, Light Hall and the very generous donation of space and subsidised parking from Aston University, we would not be able to accommodate the growing numbers of children who want to try for a place at the grammar schools in the City.

There are over 300 invigilators who oversee the entrance test along with other necessary agencies to assist with traffic management, queues and the nervousness of children and parents on the day. We are grateful to everyone who ensures this secure operation is carried out with as little disruption as possible.

One of the key factors influencing the growing number of children taking the 11+ is, I believe, our own Opening Doors strategy which is enabling us to widen access into the grammar schools. As I write this, The Learning Hub at Birmingham Airport is currently being refurbished. Once complete, we will calendar more activities for children, teachers and parents at this wonderful venue.

This will be the last Opening Doors message I write as Secretary to the Governors of King Edward VI in Birmingham as I am retiring at the end of the term after 30 years of working for this organisation. There have been many changes in education during my time here but I genuinely believe that our outreach work, familiarisation activities, professional development courses and community work are beginning to make a real difference to the lives of disadvantaged children in Birmingham. I will look forward to receiving my Opening Doors newsletter in the future and to see the positive outcomes this charity is achieving with children, teachers and parents across the City.

## The Children's University Graduation Ceremony

at King Edward's School, Edgbaston. 22nd June 2015



Anderton Park and Clifton Primary School had the great opportunity to hold the graduation ceremony for the Children's University at King Edward's School Edgbaston. The awards were in recognition of the hours of learning children had completed outside the classroom. The awards were presented by the national charity, 'The Children's University.' There were 18 children from each school receiving their awards, nearly all of whom were accompanied by their parents.
